Methodology

Critical realist, retroductive comparative approach

- Culture-led regeneration policies as 'hybridised' recurrent instances of the same structural process
- Focus on the (potentially hidden) generative mechanisms behind recurrent phenomena

Methodology

- Comparative case study analysis (Rotterdam, Genoa, Valencia)
- Semi-structured interviews, street surveys, non-participant observations (February-June 2018)

The rise of culture-led urban regeneration

- 1980s CLR as a response to the negative impacts of deindustrialisation
- Globalised practices after heralded experiences (Barcelona, Bilbao, Glasgow)
- Little attention towards the 'maritime exceptionalism' of port cities and the role of/impacts on symbolic port-city links



Rotterdam – culture, reconstruction, attractiveness and the port

- CLR goals 1990s 2010s
 - Celebrating the reconstruction of Rotterdam
 - (Re)building the city's cultural infrastructure
 - Increasing the city's attractiveness as a means to pursue port competitiveness
- Pivotal role of contemporary architecture "Manhattan on the Meuse" (e.g. regeneration of the Kop van Zuid area)
- Mega events (UEFA EURO 2000; European Capital of Culture 2001)



Luxor Theater (2001) and Kop van Zuid (late 1980s-2010s)

Genoa – mega events and long-term regeneration

Bigo, Piazza delle Feste and Biosfera in the old harbour (Columbus Expo 1992)

- CLR goals 1980s mid-2000s
 - Reconverting the derelict old harbour
 - Launching Genoa as an international destination for cultural and heritage tourism
- Long-term vision of CLR, pursued through a series of actions
- Mega events (Columbus Expo 1992; 2001
 G8 summit; European Capital of Culture 2004)

Valencia – mega events and city branding

- CLR goals 1990s 2010s
 - Launching Valencia as an international tourist destination and 'global city'
 - Redeveloping the inner harbour
- CLR as a means to pursue aggressive city branding
- Mega events (America's Cup 2007 and 2010; Formula One European Grand Prix 2008-2012)

Culture-led regeneration and symbolic port-city links

• *De/remaritimisation* – concepts used in transport economics to define the reduced or greater importance of established or new maritime activities for the local economy



- Cultural demaritimisation the loss/reduced importance of maritime cultures and tangible/intangible heritage
- Cultural remaritimisation the growing relevance of established/created maritime cultures and tangible/intangible heritage

'Port cities' vs 'Cities of Culture'?

- Clashing urban imaginaries (but also different types of societies?)
- Cultural demaritimisation local policy makers may overlook/attempt to get rid of the 'port city' image due to interurban competition (more common in the 1990s)

Genoa

"... in the late 80s [...] there was a famous [politician] who ended

a rally in Piazza de Ferrari by saying

'we don't want the city of waiters',

meaning 'we don't want the tourist city' [...]. Because the tourist

city was seen as an enemy of the industrial city"



GREEN PORT HULL

Following £310m joint investment by Siemens and Associated British Ports (ABP), Europe's largest wind turbine manufacturing plant commenced operating in December 2016. The factory, at Alexandra Dock is, 396,000 sq m in size and the service and maintenance facility 12,300 sq m. The area covered by the Green Port Hull development is equivalent to the size of 78 football pitches.

Preliminary evidence from an impact assessment, two years into a three year study, undertaken by the University of Hull's Logistics Institute, shows that Greenport Hull has created more than 2,000 jobs in the renewable sector and its supply chain.

The Arctic Corsair is the sole survivor of Hull's distant-water sidewinder trawler fleet and a key part of the nation's maritime heritage. Work involving this iconic vessel will include:

- Full restoration
- A permanent dry-berth to ensure long term preservation
- Ongoing marketing and promotion to raise awareness of her
