







It can be seen or detected in processes, attitudes and behaviour, which amount to discrimination through unwitting prejudice, ignorance, thoughtlessness, and racist stereotyping which disadvantages minority ethnic people.'






Sewell Report on Institutional Racism

'we no longer see a Britain where the system is deliberately rigged against ethnic minorities.'










Initial Reaction on Entering the Space

I found it was quite intimidating, as there were no lights, and sound all around you.

[Respondent 31]

I thought that because you're at your most vulnerable and exposed in the dark it was the only way to really listen to what was happening. Your sense of hearing sharpens when you are in the dark you can really hear the sounds. [Respondent 39]

Emotional Journey as Events Unfolded

I got a bit anxious to start off with, but when the sound started to play, it moved me and made me think how scary it was, and how tense the atmosphere was.

[Respondent 21]

Intimidated – young adults shouting around me. It was very realistic...Annoyed at the policeman's response – telling them they must've done something to provoke them; threatened to arrest.

A Sense of Injustice?

It was interesting but upsetting as you feel like you're in that position. Knowing he died for being different and doing nothing wrong. It's wrong and unnecessary.

Quite intimidated by the voices...Startled when the voices from behind came. Angry that no ambulance came straight away. The police reaction was shocking/disappointing. [Respondent 46]

Reflections on the Feedback

- Immersive audio storytelling can be a potent way to engage young people with the complex issue of racism
- The creative strategy of placing the audience in the position of 'witness' seems to deepen young people's engagement with to the Stephen Lawrence case and the issue of racism
- The use of sound alone did not diminish the experience, but instead encouraged active listening (and questioning)
- There is the potential to take this further, to motivate young people to become proactive in tackling racism

A Sense of 'Being There'

I wanted to hear it again. It was that good. It felt like I was there and I was watching it happen. I felt very involved. [Respondent 50]

I was very involved in the situation. I felt as though I was experiencing it, like a witness of the situation...

I wanted to help and scream and shout at the police because they were standing there having a general conversation.
